MUNICIPAL FINANCE FUN FACT: WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

Chapter 70 School Aid: This refers to a state mandated school funding formula that aims to establish equity amongst school districts. Funding comes from the state to localities based upon this formula, originally developed in the Education Reform Act of 1993. Currently, legislation is pending at the State House to reexamine this funding formula.

Chapter 90 Highway Funds: This is another formula derived from local roadway miles, population estimates, and employment data. Towns are reimbursed funding through MassDOT for work to keep the roads in good repair. Dighton averages about \$310,000 each year in Chapter 90 funds.

out a new meeting schedule, which is twice a month, rather than weekly. Having a Town Administrator present to manage day-to-day activities alleviates the need for such frequent meetings. The change has enabled us to streamline our process and take swifter action on necessary business. We now, as a courtesy to the public and any interested parties, post our meeting packets online along with meeting agendas and minutes. With this addition, we hope to provide the public with more information as they follow along either on Channel 9 or YouTube to what we are discussing.

The Town also submitted a letter of interest in assistance in putting together a Hazard Mitigation Plan with MEMA. Should Dighton be selected, 80% of costs of putting together this plan will be state and federally funded. The Town can then utilize the plan to qualify for more grants that would help us address vulnerabilities in our community, such as low bridges, old culverts, and the like.

The newly created TIF Review Board has met and started establishing guidelines for any businesses proposing a tax increment financing (TIF) plan in lieu of regular tax payments. Businesses using this economic development initiative make a case for this tax benefit by investing money into their business, public infrastructure, job creation, or something similar that benefits the Town. The TIF Review Board is charged with hearing these presentations and making a formal recommendation to both the Board of Selectmen and Town Meeting, should a project advance through the full process. Their second meeting, held on October 22, was centered around establishing guidelines and an application for prospective TIF holders to use in planning and presenting their project. I'd like to thank Dave DeRosa, Peter Roache, and Cathal O'Brien for their service on this committee with me.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING RESULTS - 10/15/2018

One hundred and twenty-nine voters gathered on October 15 to hear 24 articles at the Fall Town Meeting. Voters unanimously approved most articles. These included a Town Administrator By Law, amending the Zoning By laws for adult use and medical marijuana facilities, and accepting two streets as public ways (Mockingbird Lane and Silvia Way). Voters also approved expending funds to grind and repave the Town Hall campus, purchase an exhaust system for Fire Station 2, purchase bullet proof vests for our Police Department in anticipation of grant reimbursement, and provide \$25,000 to be combined with a \$25,000 grant from the state to convert the old Police Station to an Animal Shelter, among other items. Thank you, voters, for your support in these endeavors.
